

What is the Dignity for All Students Act?

The Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) protects all students from discriminationssment and bullying based on race, religion, gender, national origin, ethnic group, and sexual orientation. This includeand line in-personharassment.

What does bullying or harassment look like?

Bullying can take many forms, including:

- f Physicalabuse
 - o Hitting orpushing
- f Verbal taunting
 - o Teasing, name calling, or offensive jokes
- f Social exclusion
 - o Leaving students out or isolating students
- f Written harassment
 - o Graffiti, drawings, notes, ophotos
 - o Texts, emails, or other socialedia

How do I know if my child is being bullied or harassed?

Some children may not share instances of bullying with adults.Signsthat your childisbeingharassectan include:

- f Change inbehavior
- f Injuries, marks, obruises
- f Lost or destroyepossessions
- f Complaints of headaches or stomatches
- f Difficulty sleeping
- f Low grades or loss of interestsinhool
- f Faking sick or avoiding chool

It is important to remember that all children will respond to bullying differently.

What is my school required tdo?

Your school should have policies and procedures in place to protect students from bullying and harassment. employees have been trained to recognize and respond to potential acts of discrimination and harassment.

In addition to official curricula and Codes of Conduct guiding student interactions, your school is required t have a DASA coordinator who is responsible for overseeing the district's investigation of the incident, as well documenting that it occurred.

Once an incident is reported, the principal or campus designee is required to respond within two days.

What should I do if I believe my child is being bullied or harassed?

First and foremost, you should contact someone at your schooleport the incident. This can be the DASA coordinator, the school principal, a teacher or counselor, or any other staffbree. If the bullying or harassment is based on your child's race, religion, gender, national origin, ethnic group, or sexual orientation, you can al directly contact the New York State Education Department in one of three ways:
